How do Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) Meetings help patients and facilitate better research?

Has your doctor ever mentioned attending a MDT meeting, where doctors and health professionals of all different specialities meet to discuss medical cases? In a melanoma MDT you might find plastic surgeons, oncology surgeons, medical oncologists, radiation oncologists, dermatologists, trainee doctors, nurses and clinical trial personnel. These meetings are incredibly valuable: they ensure top quality care for patients; amazing training for medical staff; a great forum to identify key medical needs requiring research; a dedicated time to report and debate new research results; and an important opportunity to identify patients for clinical trials. They are of course all conducted with a total respect for personal information and more importantly with the best interests of the patient at heart. In reality MDTs are the



only way you can have several Professors and specialists review your individual treatment plan in one room at one time!

Many MMP patients have been identified via MDT meetings. Their participation in the project has created an incredible resource that is now well utilised by melanoma researchers, who are in turn reporting their results back to the MDTs and beyond. An awesome achievement by everyone!
